Last month I asked whether our community plate could raise \$40,000 on November 8th and your answer - in the form of donations and pledges - was a resounding "yes, we can." Over 80 individuals and families contributed about \$44,600. Adding the \$20,000 external match earmarked exclusively for our special plate made for a total of **\$64,604!** Remarkable. And our collective generosity has not gone unnoticed. Here is a letter I received from Ellen Groh, Executive Director of the Concord Coalition to End Homelessness (CCEH) addressed to "the incredible members and friends of the UU Church of Concord."

"You blew our socks off!"

I am speaking on behalf of all the Staff and Board members of CCEH when I say that the leadership and generosity you showed in response to our Challenge Match was astounding and inspiring, and we are deeply, deeply grateful.

Your congregation exemplifies "faith in action," and the Concord community is so fortunate to have your presence here. I know that you are actively engaged in many meaningful causes in this community, and I am honored that CCEH has benefitted from both Michael Leuchtenberger's extraordinary leadership on our Board of Directors, and your entire congregation's embracing of the issue of homelessness as your own.

Covid-19 has brought many extra challenges to CCEH's work to meet the immediate needs of people struggling with homelessness, and the coming winter feels like we are entering a long dark tunnel. Having enough funding in place to meet these extra challenges is such a blessing. (I'm reminded of Forest Gump when he was told that his shrimp business had been sold so he never had to worry about money again, and Forest responds, "That's good. One less thing.") Your tremendous generosity, which inspired our Challenge Match donor to even increase his Challenge, is letting us keep our focus on keeping everyone as safe as possible during this pandemic, without having to worry about how we are going to pay for it.

Ending homelessness in Concord is a big endeavor, but I truly believe we can do it. The reason I believe we can do it is because of people like you, who are so committed to creating a just and equitable society, and who put their beliefs into action!

Thank you, thank you, thank you!

It truly is a blessing to be - here - in these days - with all of you.

12/6/2020 “Making Space for Stillness,” Rev. Michael Leuchtenberger

Like hunger and thirst, loneliness is a sensation that is telling us something essential is missing - our sense of feeling connected in a meaningful way to the larger web of life. “Be still and God is with you. Be still, and you are never alone.” says Donald L. Hicks. Whether we perceive God as a creator who pays us special attention or whether we relate to ‘god’ or “the divine” as shorthand for some other, hard-to-express truth, the insight remains the same: There is something worth paying attention to, something already connected to us, and in that awareness lies a path that can satisfy a deep longing within us. The path is stillness, the experience is meeting the mystery, and the reward is a sustained sense of connection and inner peace. December's worship theme is "Stillness." The Soul Matters program phrases it as a question: what does it mean to be a People of Stillness? For many of us, December is a month of preparations - and perhaps not in the sense of Advent, where we are preparing ourselves for the birth of a savior. More in the sense of shopping frenzy, decoration frenzy, baking frenzy - a time of anything but stillness. Family life is often fraught with extra tension as children's expectations run high, parents' bandwidth runs low, and there is a relentless cultural message that it is a season to be merry and bright - even if we personally are suffering.

I invite you, this month, to create pockets of stillness. Let the jingling bells and blinking lights carry on without you for a few minutes, or moments as you tune in to your breath, or step out to look at the stars on a dark, cold night. How is it with your soul? How is it with your loved ones? How does your body feel?

This year's Christmas will be like none we have experienced before, with a pandemic raging in a deeply divided and hurting nation. For some of our children, this will be the first Christmas in their lives that they will not be in the sanctuary for our Christmas Eve service. Families who celebrate Christmas will have hard choices to make about who can safely gather around the tree on Christmas morning.

I feel that one story has been preparing me for this Christmas since my childhood - How the Grinch Stole Christmas by Dr. Seuss. It's my plan to spend my Christmas preparation energy on creating a video pageant to rival our in-person No-Rehearsal ones, and to gather with all of you from our homes for a virtual Christmas Eve. I look forward to the hush, the stillness of a silent night spent waiting for joy to be born in the morning. I will light candles, and probably shed a few tears, but I will stand, holding my light, knowing that although I cannot see it, you are holding yours, and I will sing.

May the blessings of peace and stillness be yours this season.

May love rest at the center of your heart.

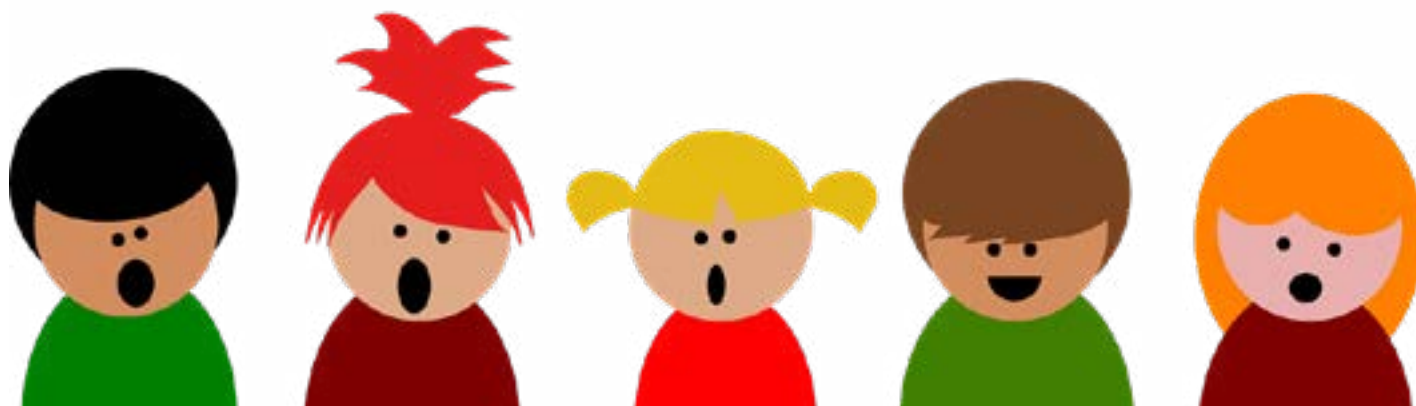
With the help of Calvin, Michael, Lyn, and Alex, the choir is able to put together biweekly virtual

Kid's Pollinator Garden Coming Soon!

Emerson Pre-School staff and families, doing Fall Clean-Up in November, helped clear out an area on the southwest corner of the hill behind the Church that had been selected for a pollinator garden. The small junk trees and shrubs are now gone and the holes dug for new, drought-tolerant pollinator shrubs that will be purchased and installed in the spring, along with selected tough pollinator perennials. Rustic stairs are being built to draw kids and adults into an insect discovery loop through the area that skirts two large pine stumps which will serve as resting spots for contemplative viewing.

If you have excess pollinator plants, please keep an eye out for a request for donations in the spring. The shrubs are being funded by an Audubon Schoolyard grant that the Church obtained in late 2018, and only partially spent at that time. A Special Announcement from Rev. Dr. Susan Frederick-Gray

I send you my deep care in this time of changing seasons and tumultuous days. I continue to hold all of you in my prayers—as you lead your communities in these fraught times.

While there is very hopeful news about the efficacy of new coronavirus vaccines, there is still cause for serious concern. Given the dramatic surge in cases, we reiterate our recommendation for congregations to plan to gather virtually through May 2021. We have made some updates to our [Guidance on](#)

[Gathering](#), including revised prevention measures and how decisions can be guided by our values.

As the holiday season approaches, I feel the grief of not being able to physically be with family and friends. While the longing to be together is real, so too is the way in-person gatherings increase risk. This pandemic is a vivid reminder that our decisions impact those around us—not only our loved ones, but those most vulnerable, including weary healthcare and essential workers. This is why we continue to lean into our values of collective care and interdependence.

The way that Unitarian Universalists are living our values is my greatest source of hope at this moment. Whether we are adapting to safely minister to one another or responding to the urgent demands of our world, UUs everywhere are showing up and making a difference.

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I continue to celebrate joyfully everyone who voted in this critical election and all who overcame the extreme voter suppression. Black, Latinx, and Indigenous people were especially targeted but they still made their voices heard. Across the country, UUs showed up to protect the integrity of the electoral process, as election workers, poll monitors and election defenders. UU the Vote and local grassroots partners—including in contested states like Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Arizona and Georgia—helped mobilize historic voter turnout!

Even as we recognize the scope of our work, I am aware of how incredibly difficult these last four years have been. And the election cycle is still laden with fraudulent claims. The President is spreading pernicious misinformation that is dangerous to our democracy. His thwarted attempts to discount votes in Detroit, Philadelphia, Atlanta and Milwaukee amount to trying to steal the electoral count and are deeply rooted in anti-Black racism. [Election Defenders](#) is a core organization to volunteer with to help protect the vote in states around the country, including important virtual actions.

We must not let these corrupt efforts overshadow the fact that the election results are a win for democracy and the will of the people. This is a time to remember our collective resilience and ability to protect each other, to defend democracy, and to organize unflinchingly for justice, equity and dignity.

As we anticipate the holiday season and create new ways to connect and celebrate this time, let's remember the joy and love present in our hearts and in our communities. Let us also make space for grief and honor the memories of those who have passed away this year. May we feel the unseen but real threads that binds us all. We are not alone. We are powerful. Our communities are powerful. And we belong to each other.

In this season, may you find restorative space to lean into what you love and what makes you feel connected. May we find strength in our faith, and in the foundation of our families, friends and the people who came before us. While there is much work ahead, may we also make room to breathe and rest, and time to connect with our community and those we love.

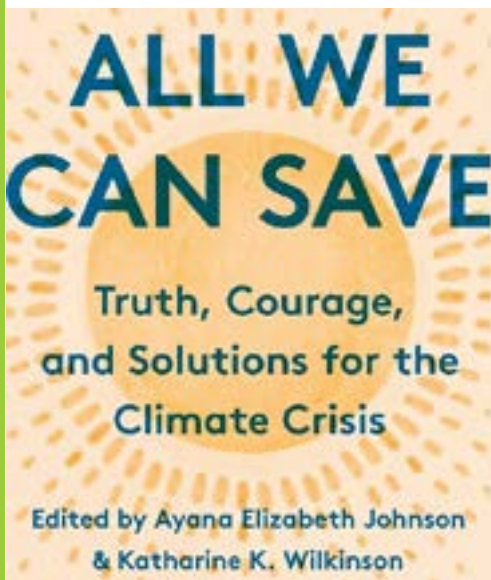
