Unitarian Universalist Church of Concord DRAFT Minutes of the Annual Meeting, May 21, 2017

Prior to opening the formal meeting, the Moderator, Anne Zinkin, explained her role and the manner in which the meeting will be held. Highlights of Robert's Rules of Order were reviewed.

Moderator Anne Zinkin called the meeting to order at 12:05 pm. A quorum was easily met with over 60 members in attendance.

ARTICLE 1 To elect a Clerk Pro Tempore to record the minutes of this meeting. This is necessary as our elected Clerk is not available to attend this meeting.

Motion: CJ Landsman moved to elect Karen Ryan as Clerk Pro Tempore. Second: Karen Mayo. Motion passes unanimously.

ARTICLE 2 To receive and accept the minutes of the 2016 Annual Meeting, and the Special Congregational Meeting of Jan. 8, 2017. All meeting minutes need to be approved.

Motion: Karen Mayo. Second: Dick deSeve. Motion passes unanimously.

ARTICLE 3 To receive and accept the Slate of Candidates.

Craig Whitson presents the slate of candidates.

Motion: Craig Whitson. Second: Jack Wakelin. Motion passes unanimously.

ARTICLE 4 To amend Article V Section 7 of the bylaws as follows:

Article V OFFICERS

Section 7. REMOVAL OF CHURCH OFFICERS, TRUSTEES, AND OTHERS, FOR GOOD CAUSE

Members of the Church, by a two-thirds vote of those present at any properly called and constituted meeting, may remove, for good cause shown, any Church officer listed in Section 1 of this Article; any trustee elected pursuant to Article VI, Section 1; or any other elected official, agent, committee chair or member. Upon any such removal, the members of the Church, by a majority vote of those present, may elect a successor to serve the unexpired term of that person or until the next Annual Meeting of the Church, whichever occurs first. This power is concurrent with the authority of the Board of Trustees under Article VI, Section 8 of these Bylaws.

This Article is necessary to clarify the process for removal Church officers.

(A 2/3 majority vote of approval by the members of the Church present and voting would be necessary to pass Article 4.)

John Tobin presents this article. The goals of this and the next 2 articles are to clarify the changes that were made to these bylaws last year. The intent of these articles is to assure that the Congregation and Board of Trustees retain the power to remove officers, trustees and others, as stated above. Ay such removal would be a major step and so should require a 2/3 vote. Additionally, should a trustee be removed from their term prematurely, any successor trustee selected to finish out that term shall hold the position only until the next Annual Meeting of the Church when the congregation can elect a person to finish the term.

Motion: John Tobin. Second: Dick Bennett

There was a discussion about the word "other," the definition of "good cause" and a question about whether it would apply to all members of the church or just committee members.

Brackett Scheffey made a motion, seconded by Vicki Wakelin, to insert the word "committee" before the word "member." This motion to amend Warrant Article 4 passed.

Fran Philippe raised a concern as to whether this bylaw would only apply to elected officers and trustees and she made a motion to amend the language by moving the phrase "elected official" to the end of that sentence. Peter Bartlett seconded that motion.

The motion to further amend Article 4 passed with one person opposed.

Lea Smith asked if this removal authority would also include the power to remove staff members. John Tobin and others said that it would not.

After brief further discussion a motion to call the question was made, seconded, and passed with one person opposed.

Anne Zinkin read Article 4 as modified by the two amendments as follows:

"Article V OFFICERS

Section 7. REMOVAL OF CHURCH OFFICERS, TRUSTEES, AND OTHERS, FOR GOOD CAUSE

Members of the Church, by a two-thirds vote of those present at any properly called and constituted meeting, may remove, for good cause shown, any Church officer listed in Section 1 of this Article; any trustee elected pursuant to Article VI, Section 1; or any other elected official, agent, committee chair or committee member, or elected official. Upon any such removal, the members of the Church, by a majority vote of those present, may elect a successor to serve the unexpired term of that person or until the next Annual Meeting of the Church, whichever occurs first. This power is concurrent with the authority of the Board of Trustees under Article VI, Section 8 of these Bylaws."

Anne Zinkin then called the vote and Warrant Article 4 passed as amended by a 2/3 vote.

ARTICLE 5 To amend Article VI Section 8 of the bylaws as follows:

Article VI BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Section 8. REMOVAL OF CHURCH OFFICERS, TRUSTEES, AND OTHERS FOR GOOD CAUSE; FILLING VACANCIES

a) Removal of Church Officers, Trustees, and Others for Good Cause

The Board of Trustees, by a two-thirds vote of those present at any properly called and constituted Board meeting, may remove, for good cause shown, any Church officer listed in Section 1 of this Article; any trustee elected pursuant to Article VI, Section 1; or any other elected official, agent, committee chair or member. This power is concurrent with the power of the members of the Church under Article V, Section 7 of these Bylaws.

b) Authority to Fill Vacancies

Upon the removal of any Church officer, trustee, or any other official pursuant to subsection (a) above or by the Congregation pursuant to Article V, Section 7 of these Bylaws, or upon the resignation, death, or incapacity of any Church officer, trustee, or any other official, the Board of Trustees, by a majority vote of those present, may appoint a successor to serve the unexpired term of that person or until the next Annual Meeting of the Church, whichever occurs first.

This Article allows the Board of Trustees to remove, for good cause, any Church officer, trustee, or any other elected official, agent, committee chair or member by a 2/3 vote of those present at a Board meeting.

This Article is also necessary to allow the Board of Trustees to appoint a successor to serve the unexpired term of any Church officer, trustee or any other elected official.

(A 2/3 majority vote of approval by the members of the Church present and voting would be necessary to pass Article 5.) In his introduction to Article 4 John Tobin also talked about this Warrant Article.

Motion: John Tobin. Second: Nancy Normand.

John Tobin made a motion, seconded by Karen Mayo to amend this Article to make it consistent with the changes in Article 4. The motion passed.

John Tobin made a second motion to amend the Warrant Article to correct two references to other Bylaw sections. This was seconded by Lee Leppanen. The motion passed.

Craig Whitson asked for an explanation as to the reasoning behind this proposed change to the Bylaws. John Tobin explained that the current version of the Bylaws requires only a majority vote by the Board for removal of officers and others, while a 2/3 vote is required when the Congregation takes this momentous step. The proposed change to the Bylaws would require a 2/3 vote by the Board also, for such an action.

Trudy Mott Smith asked why the Board should be able to remove trustees and said that only the Congregation should have this power. John Tobin pointed out that the existing Bylaws give the Board that power already and that the proposal would clarify this power and limit it by requiring a 2/3 vote.

Trudy made a motion to amend the proposed change to the Bylaws to delete paragraph (a), thereby eliminating the Board's power to remove any officers, trustees, or other officials, but continuing the Board's power to fill vacancies. Jack Wakelin seconded this motion. Brackett Scheffy said that without further study of this suggestion, it would be premature to take this power away from the Board. Andy Duncan disagreed with Trudy and agrees with Brackett that the Congregation should approve the proposed changes. He noted that it is not easy to set up a special meeting of the membership. Belinda Phillips said that when the Board is elected, the Congregation trusts them to make decisions such as these. She added that, on a practical level when it is necessary to remove someone, it may be better to have the Board do it discretely and that it may harm the Church for this to be done publicly. Tom Fredenburg said that the Board already has this power, the motion to remove this power from the Board entirely is a more serious change. John Tobin noted that if this amendment passes, we will have to go back and revise the changes made to the Bylaws by the adoption of the previous Warrant Article. He agreed with Andy Duncan that it would be easier for the Board to act quickly to deal with an urgent problem, such as theft or other harmful acts by a trustee, than to try to set up a special meeting of the Congregation. He said that if the Congregation later determined that the Board had acted improperly, it would have the ultimate power to remove any and all trustees.

A motion to call the question was made by Joyce Bennett and seconded by Erin Stewart. A majority voted to end the debate on Trudy's amendment to remove paragraph (a). The proposed amendment was defeated.

There was a further discussion of Warrant Article 5 with 2 amendments already made to it.

Dick deSeve asked under what circumstances would the Congregation vote for removal instead of the Board. Lorraine Ellis said that either body can bring something forward for a vote. John Tobin said that each body would have this authority, and that this would be a useful safeguard. In urgent cases involving misconduct, the Board could act more quickly to protect the Church. If the Congregation felt that one or more Board members, or the whole Board, were not carrying out their duties or abusing their authority, the Congregation could act, removing the entire Board if necessary. Bevan Tulk said that discretion of the Board would be very important in dealing with issues such as addiction problems and illegal acts, while the philosophy and theology are larger issues that the congregation can weigh in on.

Patty Bass asked for an example of an "agent" and sought assurance that this Bylaw would not apply to staff. Jack Wakelin explained that an agent may be a church member who fulfills the role of working with contractors, like he did during the minister's recent sabbatical.

Lee Leppanen moved to call the question, seconded by Christy Dolat Bartlett. The Motion passed.

Anne Zinkin read the Warrant Article, as modified by the two amendments, as follows:

"Article VI BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Section 8. REMOVAL OF CHURCH OFFICERS, TRUSTEES, AND OTHERS FOR GOOD CAUSE; FILLING VACANCIES

a) Removal of Church Officers, Trustees, and Others for Good Cause

The Board of Trustees, by a two-thirds vote of those present at any properly called and constituted Board meeting, may remove, for good cause shown, any Church officer listed in Article V, Section 1 of these Bylaws this Article; any trustee elected pursuant to Article VI, Section 1 of these Bylaws; or any other elected official, agent, committee chair or committee member, or elected official. This power is concurrent with the power of the members of the Church under Article V, Section 7 of these Bylaws.

b) Authority to Fill Vacancies

Upon the removal of any Church officer, trustee, or any other official pursuant to subsection (a) above or by the Congregation pursuant to Article V, Section 7 of these Bylaws, or upon the resignation, death, or incapacity of any Church officer, trustee, or any other official, the Board of Trustees, by a majority vote of those present, may appoint a successor to serve the unexpired term of that person or until the next Annual Meeting of the Church, whichever occurs first."

The article passed by a 2/3 majority, with only a few votes in opposition.

ARTICLE 6 To amend Article VI Section 1 to the bylaws as follows:

Article VI BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Section 1 CONSTITUTION, ELECTION AND TERMS OF OFFICE

[Add a new sentence at the end of the first paragraph of this Section, as follows]

Whenever a new trustee is elected by the Congregation pursuant to Article V, Section 7, or appointed by the Board of Trustees pursuant to Article VI, Section 8, the new trustee will serve until the next Annual Meeting. At the Annual Meeting, the Congregation will hold an election to fill any remaining portion of the three-year term of the trustee who was removed or replaced.

This Article is necessary to establish the term of a new trustee, either elected or appointed by the Board of Trustees, to serve until the next Annual Meeting, when a candidate will be elected to fill any remaining portion of the term of the trustee who was removed or replaced. (A 2/3 majority vote of approval by the members of the Church present and voting would be necessary to pass Article 6.)

John Tobin explained that the purpose of this proposed change to the Bylaws is to make sure that the term of a person who is appointed as a trustee to fill a vacancy lasts only until the next annual meeting, at which the Congregation can elect a successor.

Motion: John Tobin. Second: Dick deSeve. Motion passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 7 To adopt a budget for 2017-18.

Lea presented this article and asked John Warner to give a brief overview of our endowment.

John Warner prepared the following slides:

"Endowment Balances": John explained that every year the church can manage expenses but the income is very difficult to predict. The slide shows the endowment balances over a 20 year period. The endowment totals are pretty level over this period of time.

"Inputs/Outgoes": What gets added to the endowment is roughly equal to what we take out.

"Yearly Total Draw From the Endowment": 3.6% is what we ideally can take out annually.

"Draws for 'other' without GPB": We've made serious progress realizing greater income some years. Some draws were not due to covering income shortfalls but occurred because of unexpected expenses such as replacing the boiler and removing trees. Contributions made to the endowment have essentially saved us from decreasing the endowment. Consistent pledging is the most important thing that congregants can do to help out.

Lea Smith explained the budget. She said that the Finance Committee developed two alternatives, an ambitious budget and a standard budget. Pledges are by far the church's biggest sources of income. Lea reviewed the "Income" and "Expenses" slides that she prepared, explaining each item.

Michael Leuchtenberger explained that the church will be setting aside \$2000 each year in preparation for the next sabbatical period and will plan to give Lea an extra payment of \$2000 in recognition of the additional hours she was required to work during his sabbatical. Michael also mentioned that \$180,000 will be added to the endowment due to the sale of land to Concord Orthopaedics.

Lea then completed her explanation of the "Expense" slide.

A Motion to approve the budget was made by Lee Leppanen and seconded by Nancy Morse

Discussion: Andy Duncan asked about the miscellaneous line item, wanting to know if are there any solar credits factored into that. Lea said there are no solar credits in the budget, but that electric reductions are factored in. Trudy Mott Smith added that the Church will be able to sell renewable energy credits in a year. She said that at present we don't know how much money the Church will make so it has not been factored in.

Michael announced that his last minute appeal, made during the church service, has netted \$6,634 in additional pledges, which would now enable 3.5 extra hours to be added to Lifetime Faith Development (LFD) position. Michael moved to add this \$6,634 to the LFD line on the expenses sheet. Dick deSeve seconded this motion. It was noted that the total with a 3% "shrink" is \$6,435. Jack Wakelin said that this total also needed to be added to the pledge amount on the income sheet.

Lea presented an "MLFD" Plan slide and indicated that the long-term goal is to staff the position at 35 hours/week. With the additional funding commitments received today, the position will be close to 30 hours/week during the coming year.

John Tobin motioned to amend Michael's motion to include the increased amount on the income side of the budget, Lee Leppanen seconded, and Michael accepted this change to his motion as a "friendly amendment." The amended motion was approved unanimously. The budget as modified by this amendment was then approved unanimously.

ARTICLE 8 To receive and accept the reports of the Minister, Board of Trustees, staff, committees and groups.

Motion: Dick deSeve. Second: Peter Bartlett

Lea moved to amend the report of the Downing Grant Committee. The grant to the Franklin UU Church should be \$10,177.52. The motion to approve the reports passed unanimously.

ARTICLE 9 To act upon such additional business as may appropriately be brought before the meeting.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was made by Lee Leppanen and seconded by Peter Bartlett. The motion passed unanimously and the meeting was adjourned at approximately 1:20p.m.

Article One: To authorize the Reverend Michael Leuchtenberger to sign the New Hampshire Immigration Solidarity Network's Statement of Support, Accompaniment, Advocacy, and Sanctuary on behalf of the congregation.

(The vote will be conducted by paper ballots of those present. A simple majority vote of approval by the congregation would be necessary to pass Article One.)

Interested people are welcome to come to the meeting and may speak when properly recognized by the moderator, but may not vote unless their name is included on the list of members posted in the church 15 days in advance of the meeting, pursuant to Article IV, Section 4 of the Church's Bylaws.

Unitarian Universalist Church of Concord DRAFT Minutes of the Special Meeting, Sunday, October 1, 2017

Moderator Anne Zinkin opened the meeting at 12:15 pm by reviewing Robert's Rules of Order and reading the Warrant Article. It was determined that a quorum was present as over forty members were in attendance. (Currently, total membership stands at 274 members.)

At 12:25 pm, Anne Zinkin called the meeting to order.

Trustee Chair Lisa Eberhart asked for a moment of silence prior to discussion.

Rev. Leuchtenberger then explained the history of the NH Immigrant Solidarity Network. Printed copies of the "Statements of Support, Accompaniment, Advocacy, and Sanctuary" were made available to all the attendees.

Anne Zinkin then read Warrant Article One, as follows:

"To authorize the Reverend Michael Leuchtenberger to sign the New Hampshire Immigration Solidarity Network's Statement of Support, Accompaniment, Advocacy, and Sanctuary on behalf of the congregation." It was explained that the vote will be conducted by paper ballots of those members present. A simple majority vote of approval is necessary to pass Article One.

Anne Zinkin asked for a motion to move the Article for discussion. Motion made by James Locke and seconded by Chris Soule.

Discussion ensued. Michael Leuchtenberger emphasized that our congregation does not have permission to edit the Statement in any way. At this point, the congregation is simply being asked to give permission to Michael Leuchtenberger to sign this Statement on behalf of the congregation. The Statement notes that "each faith community determines for itself what role they will play in the Network and what level of support they will offer."

Richard Bennett called for a vote. David Brown seconded. The motion to call the question was then passed by a 2/3 majority. Paper ballots were distributed to all members present. Votes were tallied and results were forty (40) 'Yes' votes and four (4) 'No' votes for a total of forty-four (44) votes cast. Article One passed.

Nancy Morse made a motion to adjourn. Joyce Bennett seconded.

Anne Zinkin adjourned the meeting at 12:45 pm.

Financial Reports

Karen Mayo, Treasurer, and Lea Smith, Congregational Administrator

The pages that follow show the status of our operating budgets and designated funds held within our checking account, for Fiscal Years 2016-17 (August 2016 to July 2017) and 2017-18 to date (August 2017 to March 2018.)

The 13-month Rolling Balance Sheet (Page 20) primarily shows the balance in our checking account at the end of each month. This balance includes all the small temporary "Designated/Restricted Funds" within the checking account, as well as unrestricted operating cash. "Retained earnings" is the carryover (shortfall or surplus) from the prior year's operating budget. "Net income" is the profit or loss for the operating budget for that month. Our Rolling Balance Sheet does not include funds in the Endowment or Memorial Garden Trust Fund, as the Board of Trustees re-affirmed in June 2017 that the Custodian of Trust Funds is currently responsible for maintaining these records (see page 26 for his report.)

Fiscal Year 2016-17

The 2016-17 Budget vs. Actual report (page 21-22) is shown in the program format as passed by the congregation at Annual Meeting 2016.

During the winter of 2016-17, it became apparent that we had a significant shortfall in pledges, as well as a shortfall in anticipated parking income. In the spring of 2017, the Board of Trustees authorized an additional withdrawal of \$17,000 from the Endowment to cover this anticipated shortfall. However, largely due to the diligent efforts of our Stewardship Committee, pledges came in only \$11,790 short. Pledges were fulfilled at a rate of 97.5%, a record high in recent years. Also, our expenses were under budget in most programs. Therefore, with 20/20 hindsight we realized that we had not needed to take the \$17,000 extra withdrawal!

Fiscal Year 2017-18

The 2017-18 Budget vs Actual report (pages 23-25) is shown in the line item format as the year has not ended to be able to assess program budget performance. Through March 31, 2018, our pledge payments deficit stands at about \$12,000. We anticipate a shortfall in pledges of approximately \$7000 for the year. However, this will be offset by at least \$4000 in additional parking rental income, and about \$3000 more in net Auction income than anticipated. Thank you, Auction Team!

Expenses are tracking about where we expect at this time. Our Stewardship expense budget has been exceeded due to the helpful visit of Mike Durall, but Rev. Michael Leuchtenberger authorized this overage to be paid from other underspent budget lines, as permitted by the Bylaws.

Due to the aforementioned \$17,000 Endowment withdrawal that turned out not to be needed in 2016-17, we have been able to slow the pace of budgeted Endowment withdrawals in 2017-18. We have only made one quarterly withdrawal, even though we are well into the third quarter. We hope these delays will allow the Endowment to produce greater dividends while the market has been high. In addition, we may be able to reduce our final annual budgeted draw from the Endowment, if expenses and pledge payments stay on track between now and July. At publication time, we have withdrawn only \$16,450 on a budget allowance of \$45,900.

Report of the Custodian of the Trust Funds

as of April 1, 2018

Jack Wakelin, Custodian of the Trust Funds

The balance in the Trust Fund as of March 31th, 2017 was \$1,715,824 and \$1,839,893 on March 31, 2018. The sale of the small parcel of land to Concord Orthopedic mentioned in last year's report closed in June of 2017 and the proceeds (\$180,000 minus closing costs) were deposited to the Trust Fund account.

Gifts to the Trust Fund of \$10,758 as well as the annual interest payment from Community Loan Fund of \$1250 were deposited during the report period.

The monthly loan repayment (\$6,692) to Eastern (formally Centrix) Bank for the Greener Building Project (GBP) continues and resulted in a total of \$80,301 in loan repayments during the period of this report. We have now completed approximately six years of the ten year period of the Greener Building Project (GBP) loan. While the annual cost of the GBP payments constitutes slightly over half of our estimated 8% draw from the Endowment this church year, the 40% reduction in natural gas use each winter and the increased comfort experienced by our members and renters will continue to be appreciated long after the loan payments are completed.

Harvest Capital of Concord continues to manage the trust fund following the socially responsible investing guidelines established by the congregation and monitored by our Trust Funds Committee. The funds are located with Charles Schwab Institutional.

The Memorial Garden Endowment is invested through Fidelity in a mutual fund and had a balance of \$25,400 on 3/31/17. This past year, \$2,000 was withdrawn for maintenance. However, overall fund growth for the year resulted in a fund balance decrease of only approximately \$750 with a fund total of \$24,656 on March 31, 2018.

Stewardship Committee Report

Congregational Pledging Way Up...Our Foundation Will Be Strengthened!

Our congregants have come through big-time for this year's pledge campaign! They have responded to Michael's reminders that the demands on Church Administrator Lea Smith are no longer sustainable without strengthening the church office. Members' and friends' record outpouring ensures that the church's working foundation, its office, will be strengthened in the coming church year with the addition of a new part-time position. Some facts and figures as of May 1:

Renewed pledges: \$200,717 (106 households)

Assumed Continuing pledges: \$86,321 (91 households)

(These are folks we haven't heard from yet.)

TOTAL TO DATE: \$287,038 (197 households)

This represents a net overall increase of more than \$33,000 to date over last year's record pledging! In other words, we've smashed the latest record by over \$33,000 and we're not even done. We still need you to file your pledge card as soon as possible, even if you don't intend to change your pledge. The goal of increasing overall pledging by \$40,000 still stands, so that the church will be positioned to weather unanticipated cost increases or income shortfalls, and will have a strong foundation for next year and beyond.

Deepest thanks to our 197 member and friend households who have strengthened our church enormously with your loyal support! Well done!
