Contemplative Practices

My husband and I moved to Concord in the Fall of 2020, smack dab in the middle of the pandemic. We were both retired now, so finding a way to connect with our new community seemed like a daunting task. In spring of 2021, while chatting with a neighbor, she suggested I check out Concord UU. She said that currently, in-person attendance might be limited but the Sunday Service was available via livestream through the Church's website. I explored the website and was delighted to see that a wide variety of Contemplative Practices were offered including YOGA! I had recently completed YTT (Yoga Teacher Training) before we moved, but was unsure where or when I would have an opportunity to teach. I approach Yoga as a practice for Wellness that incorporates Body, Mind and Spirit. I believe that EVERYONE should have the opportunity to experience the Joys of Yoga. "If you are breathing, you are doing Yoga"!

I soon started attending services in person and participated in a variety of the Contemplative Practices offered including Yoga. Knowing that I'd found "my peeps", I joined Concord UU in December 2022. Since becoming a member, I have been offered opportunities to serve the Church in a variety of capacities, but the Contemplative Practices hold a special place in my heart.

4/6/2025 "Joy of Community" Rev. Michael Leuchtenberger

"When I first came in I did not expect to find such warm and inquiring minds, such open and honest share, laughter, oh laughter everywhere." While there may not be laughter everywhere, there is a joy being in community, belonging to a community, that is more than simple pleasure or temporary happiness. What might that look like at a time when many experience rather mixed emotions? What role can our community play in balancing the anguish, fear, frustration, and sorrow so prevalent in society at large? 4/13/2025 "Joy as Bravery" Rev. Michael Leuchtenberger

Deciding to have joy is an act of resistance. Embracing joy, especially in the face of adversity or authoritarian rule, is a forceful and defiant act, a way of reclaiming agency and challenging those in power. Joy contains the seeds of hope. Joy undermines those trying to control others through fear and intimidation. Yes, joy can be considered as bravery, for joy can take courage, as often expressed in the tradition of African American spirituals. "Yonder Come Day" and "I'm Gonna Sing!" are two new choir pieces that will remind us of the bravery and joy of celebrating your own culture and spirituality when surrounded by darkness. As Sojourner Truth said: "I will not allow the light of my life to be determined by the darkness around me."

4/20/2025 "Opening to Joy" Rev. Michael Leuchtenberger

In times of devastating loss and disorienting transitions it often seems impossible to reconnect with contentment, much less joy. Love of self and others can be a stretch. The Easter story is one of resurrection of love incarnate, the reanimation of our soul as we begin to find hope, an invitation to open to joy after the turmoil of losing what's dearest to our hearts. As the choir will tease us with a new Jason Shelton arrangement: "A new life is calling, come out from the shadows! Roll away the stone of your hesitant heart."

4/27/2025 "In Harmony with the Earth" Margaret Fletcher

What does it mean to live in harmony with our precious Mother Earth? To bring our faith into action, we're called to serve the most precious moral owner of this church: Mother Earth herself. One way our congregation does this is to align with the Unitarian Universalist Association's Green Sanctuary movement. Under the guidance of this denominational initiative, the greater UU faith community is "called to engage in an ambitious environmental and climate justice movement that seeks to live fully our principles and achieve our vision of a sustainable and just world for all."

What inspires you, what moves you to caretake the globe's human and more-than-human relatives at this time of climate crisis? Members of the Green Sanctuary working groups will share their stories and invite you to consider this church as a home for climate justice and active love for our one home planet. This Sunday Service will be followed by a Green Sanctuary Inspiration Fair in Fellowship Hall, where you can meet Green Sanctuary team members and tell us your vision for green faith in action at our church.

Come meet members of the Green Sanctuary working groups and learn about our current efforts. You can sign on to join one of our working groups, chat with us about your own green actions, or tell us what you'd like to see happening at our church to bring our faith into action for climate justice.

The church's current Green Sanctuary working groups include:

- WindowDressers: Our congregation and the Concord Lions are co-sponsoring a WindowDressers
 community build on October 23 through 28. This effort will build low- to no-cost window inserts for
 members of the greater Concord community, to help families reduce their greenhouse gas
 emissions, save money and keep their homes warm and cozy.
- ELM: Our Ecological Land Management group supports us to care for our land through work days, trainings and making resources available, to help us learn sustainable land management and gardening methods.
- GLAD: This winter we began the Green Legislative ADvocacy team, to advise us through email when ecology-related legislation is in process at the State House and encourage us to make our voices heard around these bills.
- Green Building 2.0: Having tabled the possibility of a geothermal system due to cost, we've now turned our attention to making energy-saving updates to our church building. This team has moved to the standing Building Maintenance committee for partnering.

These efforts are underway, and there are so many possibilities. Our question for you: what can we be doing as a faith community to heal and nurture this environment where all human and more-than-human relatives wish to thrive? Stop by and tell us your ideas! Building Beloved Community Beyond the Binary



Try Being a Delegate to the UUA General Assembly

We are asking, "Would you be interested in representing our church as a voting delegate in the 2025 Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) General Assembly (GA) in Baltimore, Maryland? You can attend virtually or in person, with thousands of Unitarian Universalists (UUs) from around the country. Unitarian Universalists will come together, en masse, for GA 2025, from Wednesday-Sunday, June 18-22, 2025, on the east coast--this time in Baltimore, Maryland. The 64th GA will be a multi-platform event, with the main stage hosted at the Baltimore Convention Center with hundreds more joining on the Whova virtual event experience app.

This is the annual gathering where the UUA conducts its denominational business in plenary sessions; holds spiritually-transcendent, engaging worship services; features multiple lecture series from distinguished guests, which have now become a part of our living tradition literature; hosts several critical workshops and lectures addressing matters of social justice within the context of our current societal challenges, reflecting how our UU values and ethics intersect with these cultural and political crises; and facilitates the reunion of UUs, bringing together long-term friends and introducing first-time relationships which promise to flourish.

As a Delegate it would be your duty to attend all the general sessions in which you will be allowed to vote on behalf of our church as to how you believe we as a congregation stand on prominent issues affecting Unitarian Universalism worldwide. It is the collective view of voting delegates at General Assembly 2025 that will fashion the direction for our international faith community.

All we ask when you return is that you report back to us, your congregation, by writing about your experience for Parish Notes, perform a speaking part in a Sunday service, or maybe participate in a Second Hour discussion.

While in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, two summers ago for GA 2023 (since the UUA has determined that our annual gatherings will be entirely virtual every other year for environmental and other social-oriented reasons), I found the meeting to be an exhilarating, inspiring, and spiritually uplifting experience. The opportunity to participate in the democratic process to help shape the future direction of our faith was incredibly empowering. Walking through the Exhibit Hall, examining the newest publications from "In Spirit", the UUA bookstore, and other sacred merchandise, such as items emblazoned with the "Side with Love" message was fun to both see and touch directly.

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Maundy Thursday | April 17 at 6 pm

Susi Nord and Rev. Jim Curley will lead a service commemorating the last meal Jesus shared with his disciples, when he asked them to remember him each time they broke bread and drank wine. He broke with convention by washing their feet before the meal, modeling the idea of being a servant leader. This service will include a ritual footwashing, Bible passages describing this event, and a communion of bread and grape juice, using the communion set donated to our church by Ellen Tucker, first wife of Ralph Waldo Emerson. All are welcome.

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Finally, attending the several General Assemblies that I have been privileged to attend as a congregational delegate from our church has presented me with an opportunity to become better acquainted with UUs from around the United States and the world. This dynamic experience has supported me with my spiritual growth; understanding of UU history; and familiarity with UU polity, the important governance practices of the Unitarian Universalist Church.

If you have now been persuaded to inquire about being a delegate from our congregation, please reach out to me to express your interest and learn more. If selected, You will need to register for GA online through the UUA Website, the sooner the better, to receive a discount on your registration fee. The registration link at www.uua.org/ga/registration describes the various types of registration options for both virtual and in-person involvement, discounts for various groups, potential financial assistance from the UUA, and more.

Our congregation may have as many as six in-person or virtual delegates. This responsibility, however, requires that you acquaint yourself with the various policies and issues that our faith community is addressing. The deadline for expressing your interest to serve as a delegate is April 30, 2025.


