Why My Heart Is Here

Why is my heart here? Easy. **Village.** Since joining the UU I have repeated this word countless times: my mantra, my purpose, my prayer. It's the people who keep me tethered. These caring relationships, the love shared between us, the welcoming of strangers are where I find the sacred.

Before the UU, I felt out of place in the world, lonely and unsure where I fit in. When I became pregnant with my daughter, I knew I wanted more for my children and for myself. I first entered the UU in search of community, but stayed because it became my family.

This sense of family has really shown up for me. When I had a difficult pregnancy, a circle of women from the church visited me in my home for a day of nurturing me as a mother, as opposed to the baby. When I am absent for a while, people notice and reach out, reminding me of my belonging. When I am overwhelmed, someone offers a helping hand, a moment of watching the children, or just good company. I've built friendships while washing dishes in the church kitchen, gained perspective listening to stories from elders, and even found chosen family who have become my youngest child's godparents. This community doesn't just talk compassion; it practices it in ways that generate lasting bonds.

This village also shapes my family. Each week, my infant is passed lovingly from one set of arms to another, giving me a bit of freedom to socialize and reset. My children see their regular and consistent friend group through the kids' programs. My seven-year-old daughter walks hand in hand with elders, deep in conversation about mythology, ecology, or history, soaking up their wisdom. My husband, initially reluctant to join a church, now signs us up for more than our schedule...

Hope is often described as a feeling inside an individual heart—but hope, at its deepest and most transformative, is a communal force. Something that lives between us, not only within us. Something we generate and sustain together. In times of discouragement, it can be hard to kindle hope alone. But when we step into community—into circles of song, shared stories, collective purpose—we find that hope behaves differently. It grows. It multiplies. It becomes something larger than the sum of our individual spirits.

Darkness is not the enemy of hope. It is the place where hope goes to gather strength. Yet we live in a world that urges us to avoid the darkness and move toward the light as quickly as possible. But spiritually and emotionally, darkness is not always a problem to be solved. Often, darkness is a necessary part of our human journey. When daylight returns in winter, the earth doesn't rush. It turns degree by degree. And then, before we realize it, the morning arrives earlier, and the shadows shorten. Our inner seasons move in much the same way.

...can accommodate and lists off the men at church who have inspired him to be a better man himself. My five-year-old son insists on setting tables with Chris, an adult congregant who has quietly become one of his heroes. Chris never treats him like a child underfoot; rather, he treats him like a helper and a friend. In a world where raising boys often feels daunting, I am profoundly grateful for this example.

Between all of us, we are at the church 4-6 days a week! It is our second home, where we love to be. In our congregation, my children learn through watching how to serve with kindness, how to listen, and how to show up for others. My husband and I are also taught by example the same grace and generosity we wish to instill in our children. That is what a village should be about. My heart is here because this is what the world needs more of: elders who provide loving guidance, peers who nurture together, and a village where every person, young or old, knows they belong.

You—yes, you—are so important! Whether you are a newcomer, someone who's been attending for a while but still finding your way, or a long-timer looking to “reach out to the new,” you are indeed so important, and we welcome and value your presence.

The Congregant Engagement Team (CET), has been meeting regularly since 2024 to brainstorm and implement ways to help you feel like this is a community that invites, includes, and excites you. Who are the folks in the CET? Well, we’re the ones in this photo! Hi! We are Renee West, Susan Casey, Krista Robichaud, Lorraine Ellis, Jeff Abbe, and Lea Smith (along with Rev. Michael Leuchtenberger.) Since our first meeting, we’ve been working on creative and impactful ways of engaging with you, from when you walk in to when you walk out, as well as after that.

If you’re a newcomer, we’ve been creating a whole-community approach to welcoming you. In October 2024 we held a workshop to raise awareness of how greeters and ushers can be more sensitive to the varying needs of our visitors, making you feel valued and included right from the start. This September, we held a Spiritual Hospitality Workshop, where we discussed how everyone in this community can share in the joyful, spiritual practice of welcoming you.

If you’re part of an Exploring Membership group, you’ll have someone who serves as a guide for your group, creating ways to connect with each other both in the group and as a group. Your guide can also help connect you with nice folks throughout the church and to church activities that spark your interest.

If you’ve been attending for a while, you might long to get involved in ways that are meaningful to you or help with your spiritual practice. We offer an Engagement Fair every year that showcases all that we’re doing. Last February we held an event after the service where we gathered in small groups around the Sanctuary to make connections between our individual passions and our church programs. We created the “Why My Heart is Here” articles in Parish Notes to help you gain deeper knowledge about the people in the church and the ways they’re involved.

Filling the Well December Second Hour Sessions offered by the Contemplative Practices Group

The late poet Raymond Carver, in one of his last poems, answered the question “What did you want from this life?” with the words: “To feel myself beloved on the earth.” This experience—of being seen, cared for and beloved—is yearned for by humans because from the moment we are born, it is the experience that allows us to feel deeply safe, and also to feel nourished and empowered to become and express ourselves, fully.

The psychologist Daniel P. Brown developed a meditation practice which, drawing on the Tibetan tradition of visualization practices, allows the practitioner to imaginatively experience perfect care. (Our bodies, minds and hearts mostly don’t recognize the difference between imagination and reality, as you may have noticed.) We can imaginatively, but truly, fill our inner well with the experience of such sensitive and wholehearted care that when we open our eyes, we have come to know a new way of feeling in ourselves. This allows a new way of seeing the world and what is possible for us, as beings and actors in the world. And as we begin to act based on these new views, we have new experiences that can gradually replace the old views and expectations—this is where the real magic happens.

During the Second Hour period on the two Sundays in December (Dec. 14 and 21), the Contemplative Practice group will offer an introduction to this practice, known as the Ideal Parent Figure Protocol. Guided by Jeanne Ann Whittington, this is one of the practices that was offered in the “Kindness Clinic” during the September half-day retreat. All are welcome; no experience necessary. Think of it as a gift to give yourself during the holiday season!

Covenant Group Open Enrollment January 1 to 18, 2026

Covenant groups are groups of ten to twelve people who meet monthly for a check-in and facilitated discussion of a topic of interest. These groups allow our members and friends to develop deeper relationships with people and to form circles of care for mutual celebration and support in times of struggle. Many of our groups explore the monthly worship theme in their meetings. Participants are encouraged to make this a high-priority commitment of at least one year. Meetings last between 90 minutes and two hours.

Why join a Covenant Group?

Regular monthly participation allows members to develop trust, mutual respect, and deep connection while supporting your own spiritual discernment. Each group develops its own covenant, or set of promises, that they make to one another. Many groups designate one person as the regular facilitator and some share that responsibility among their members. Groups are encouraged to work together on at least one service project each year.
