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Minister's Musings: Insights from our 2025 Ends Survey

Thank you for the phenomenal response rate to our 2025 Ministry / Ends Survey.

Demographics

We received 199 responses from members (80%), friends (13.5%) and visitors (6.5%). More than half of our members responded! And way to go elders! Those 75 years or older made up a quarter of respondents, with 62% between 45 and 74 years old, and only 14% younger than 45. Adults with children participating in church made up 13%, single/widowed/divorced/separated adults accounted for 32%, while over half were married/partnered adults (without children participating in church).

Most self-identified as introverted (45%) while only 17% see themselves as extroverted, with 38% noting they are about equal. The way people make decisions split out as follows: More thinking (29%), more feeling (26%), and about equal (45%). **My take away: it remains important to offer programming that speaks to the head AND the heart, and we need to offer activities that serve introverts even when the general culture encourages extroversion.**

A quarter of you participate in worship either exclusively online (5%), more online (7%), or about even online and in person (12%). Less than 40% attend in person exclusively. **Take away: Investing in our online infrastructure remains worthwhile even in this post-COVID time.**

Strength is often retroactive. Narratives help us notice this. Agency gives us chances to practice it. Creativity gives us tools to express and integrate it. Together, they reveal a truth that was there all along: You are not resilient because you never fall. You are resilient because you keep finding ways to rise, reshape, reconnect, and reimagine. And over a lifetime of doing that, again and again, a quiet knowing grows: You are stronger than you think.

Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction

8 week course | Spring 2026

Mindfulness-Based Stress Reduction (MBSR) is an 8-week course for training in mindfulness in daily life. Practices of gentle yoga and meditation will be used to cultivate a sustained, awake way of being, during both formal practice as well as the ordinary moments in everyday life. Commitment to daily practice is the most important element of this course. Benefits can include reduction of stress, fatigue, anxiety and physical or psychological pain, and can include an increased sense of aliveness, joy, well-being and connection to all life on this Earth. Participants often discover new ways of coping and responding to life's difficulties. Risks can include time pressure related to engaging in home practice, being challenged and facing the unknown, and experiencing an increased awareness of difficult emotions.

Insights from our 2025 Ends Survey

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Ministry

We have conducted Ministry Surveys in 2017, 2018, 2020, 2022, and 2025, providing valuable comparisons of how we are doing over time. I was deeply encouraged to see that for most of our ends (goals), the collective impression has been that we are doing noticeably better than before. Most questions asked for responses on a scale of 1 to 10. Here are some that stood out:

- **Pastoral Care:** an average rating of 8.0 when asked how well care and support met your expectations, compared to 7.0 in the early years of the survey.
- **Leadership:** an average rating of 8.7 when asked how effective our leaders are. 19% identified as current leaders, compared with 14% in 2018. That's 38 people who know they are leaders, and that's just the folks who responded!
- **Exchange of Wisdom:** When asked how meaningful the interactions have been when you have connected with those in life stages and with experiences different from your own, the rating moved from 7.0 to 7.8.
- **Worship:** The rating moved from 8.1 to 8.8 when asked how rich and diverse our worship offerings are. Music contributed particularly highly to your sense of being nurtured, challenged, and inspired. The ratings went from 8.0 to 8.5. Sermons came in "second" with a rating of 8.3 (compared to 7.3 or lower in previous years). And rituals moved from 6.8 to 7.6.

The sanctuary is viewed as the most important space for our religious life (9.1), with Fellowship Hall (8.2) and the Kitchen (7.2) still receiving high marks. The playground stood out at the bottom of the list at 3.9, unchanged from 2022.

A remarkable number indicated that you feel you have changed or grown as a result of your involvement at church. The average score was 8.0, almost a full point higher than the 7.1 in previous years. And there was a similar jump when asked how strongly your experience of lifelong learning has been influenced by the people and offerings at church. Average ratings went from 6.5 in 2017 to 7.8 in 2025.

Church offerings have played an increasingly important role in supporting your daily practice, reflected by a shift from 6.4 to 7.3, with about half reporting to practice every day or at least multiple times a week.

End #1 (*Our thriving congregation is living into a culture of belonging, centered in love, compassion, curiosity, courage, and joy*) is brand new, so no comparisons are available. Yet I was delighted to note an 8.4 rating when asked how well we are evolving to meet the times. I was similarly encouraged to see an average response of 8.1 to the question to what degree being a part of the congregation deepens your compassion for self and others. I assume that even those who responded with a 5 or a 6 (on a scale of 1 to 10), feel some sense of increased compassion. Yay!

Finally, I was tickled to see that so many of you experienced a real sense of joy when engaging in church activities - implied by a rating of 8.2. No surprise then, that you “feel the love” at an average rating of 8.2, whatever exactly that means. 😊

Love-in-Action Meeting Sunday, Feb. 8 | 11:30am

Our faith calls upon us to be radical emissaries for truth and love.



On March 2, 2025 the first meeting was held of what was to become Love-in-Action. Michael and Barbara Keshen co-facilitated the meeting which was described as, "If you have been feeling overwhelmed by the daily barrage emanating from Washington, you are not alone. All are encouraged to attend this meeting. Our faith calls upon us to be radical emissaries for truth and love".

A lot of excitement and sharing of ideas happened during the first meeting. It was decided to name the group Love-in-Action. A committee was immediately formed by Barbara Keshen to write letters to the editor. In addition, people signed up to receive email alerts about specific pieces of state and national legislation and how to oppose or support them.

A second meeting was held November 9 to discuss what concrete and constructive actions we can take to work toward societal and political change, to advance our shared values and to support each other. We continued our discussions of state and national issues, came up with new ideas and welcomed new members.

Bev Pietlicki, Sarah Colombo and I have been meeting since then. We drafted and sent out a survey to participants, asking their priorities on social justice issues and actions. Responses to the survey in order of number of votes (several items received the same number of votes):

1. Immigration/Refugee Support and Civil Rights (tied);
2. Voting rights, Constitutional rights and Healthcare (all tied); and
3. Women's Reproductive Rights.

THE NEXT LOVE-IN-ACTION MEETING IS ON SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 8 at 11:30 AM, and will be an educational session. We will have two speakers: Amy Metcalf, the Chair of the Merrimack County Dems; and Dave Luneau, a state representative since 2014. Each will speak on the state legislative process. This will include how to learn about upcoming bills, when their hearings will occur and how to oppose or support these bills. Also discussed/explained will be local resources for legislative actions and very specific ways to become involved.

These are indeed the times that try our souls. These are the times that instill fear -- testing our strength, our resolve, our spirits. So how do we find courage in the face of fear?

We all experience courage but we do so differently. Not one of us is strong all the time -- not one of us lacks the capacity for strength. Now is the time to practice courage. When we are unsure, we can act our way into knowing. One sure step we can take is to join together in community -- to find our strength with one another and courage in our shared values and our shared commitment. Together we are strong. Together we are brave.

Printed Directories are Coming

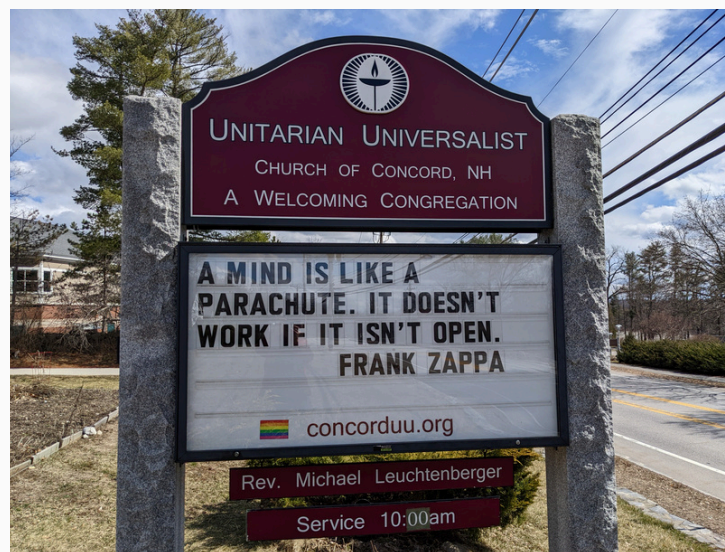

The Wayside Pulpit needs additional volunteers!

The Wayside Pulpit is one of the ways that our Church reaches out to the larger community. The Wayside Team is in need of volunteers to change the sermon titles and quotations. A member of the Team, each week, in rotation, researches a short quotation that reflects that week's sermon topic and installs it on the west side of the Wayside Pulpit using moveable letters. We install the sermon topic on the east side. With 3 more team members no one's turn will come up more than once a month.



The roadside bulletin board was first introduced to North American churches in 1919 by Henry Hallam Saunderson, minister of the First Parish Church (Unitarian) of Brighton, Massachusetts, and secretary of the American Unitarian Association's publicity department from 1915 to 1921. Saunderson noticed that "many bulletin boards in front of churches were ineffectual because they were either kept empty or held notices which had outlived their usefulness." Inspired by the local wayside shrines he had seen in Europe, he decided to create "wayside sermons," liberal messages that would make people stop, read, and search their conscience.

Because we livestream our worship service, we plan to offer worship service every Sunday, regardless of what Mother Nature sends our way. If a serious storm is expected to create dangerous road conditions on a Sunday morning, we encourage you to watch our livestream. The Sanctuary will be open for Michael to broadcast the livestream and you are welcome to join him if you feel safe going out. Support staff and volunteers are not expected to attend if they don't feel safe doing so.

In the unlikely event we must cancel (such as in case of power outage, or if a pulpit guest can't make it) it would be announced as follows:

For events other than Sundays

Group leaders are responsible to decide whether to cancel their group, and should let their group members know. The church parking lot is regularly plowed until 10pm, but walkways may or may not be shoveled/sanded when you arrive. Shovels and sand buckets are provided at the entrances. Group leaders should email lea@concorduu.org and becky@concorduu.org if you are cancelling so office staff can help keep folks informed of your cancellation via our church calendar and Facebook. (We do not use WMUR except on Sundays.)



Is it ok to publish your photo?

The Unitarian Universalist Church of Concord takes posed group photos, candid photos, and videos to illustrate the life of our church. We love sharing photos, but we want to honor your wishes about photo publication. For adults, we assume you don't mind having your photo published unless you tell us otherwise. We are more careful with the photos of children and ask for permission from their parent or guardian.

For adults:

If you want to opt out of the use of your recognizable photo in church print and digital publications, please notify the office. The office will maintain a list of members, friends, and visitors who have opted out. We ask that you not participate in group photos since it's impossible to check every face in a large group!

For minors under age of 18:

We will not publish recognizable photos, audio, or video of children taken during church activities without approval of their parent or guardian. All parents who register for Children and Youth Programs will be asked to accept or decline an image release.

A list of children whose images may not be published will be maintained. We will assume permission is ongoing unless a parent or guardian revokes it.

Permission is considered granted to use photos or videos of minors submitted by parents/guardians to public church forums. Example: Sunday morning diary slides, Facebook posts on our group forums, submissions for eBulletin or Parish Notes.

Planning the Budget for Next Year

It is time to start planning the church's 2026-27 church budget. We need to plan for all anticipated operating expenses, capital expenses, and revenue sources. The operating and capital budgets will be drafted by Michael Leuchtenberger and Lea Smith in consultation with the Operations Leadership Team, Board of Trustees, and other church leaders. The congregation will vote whether to approve the proposed budgets at the Annual Meeting in June.

If your team/committee/group/project anticipates expenditures for your activities, please share the details with us, by March 10. An Operating Budget request is required for any group/program/staff with regular operating expenses. We are also asking you to let us know how much your program/event will bring in, if anything. For example, if you are running a fundraiser, or if you offer retreats or classes for which participants will pay a fee. Some groups may also be planning a capital project, defined as non-recurring expenses that exceed \$3,000.

Fiscal year 2026-27 runs from August 1, 2026 to July 31, 2027. If you would like to make a budget request but did not receive the online forms via email, please be in touch with Lea Smith, lea@concorduu.org.
