Just to listen to whatever is in your heart. Just to be in community with you. Just to connect with an old friend, or make a new one.

This year the phone-a-thon happens on November 19 and 20, though some of the callers might call on other days. When you see an unknown number on your caller ID or you get an unexpected email, please open your heart to a connection that can be so hard to find in our divided and isolating world.

11/2/2025 "Gratitude as a Choice" Rev. Michael Leuchtenberger

Making gratitude a way of life is less about a single moment of feeling thankful and more about developing a habit of noticing what's already here. It's about training our hearts and minds to keep returning, again and again, to wonder and appreciation. It's about the rituals we create that move gratitude from an occasional feeling to a daily rhythm. It's about learning to be grateful for the small kindnesses, the bits of beauty, the quiet resilience that exist alongside hardship. Gratitude is a choice we'd do well to make.

11/9/2025 "Welcoming Gratitude" Rev. Michael Leuchtenberger

Gratitude, though deeply meaningful, isn't always simple. It lives both as a genuine inner posture and as a cultural expectation—and those expectations can uplift or burden, connect or silence, depending on how they're held. Gratitude can be a social glue, cultivating warmth, reinforcing respect, and guiding us to look beyond ourselves. And gratitude can be used to silence, pressure, or control. How can we find the balance between genuine gratitude and performative thankfulness? How can we welcome gratitude with authenticity and sincerity?

11/16/2025 "Look for the Helpers" Rev. Michael Leuchtenberger

Fred Rogers once said that when scary or tragic things happen, his mother would tell him: "Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping." When we "look for the helpers," we are not denying that something hard or frightening is happening. We are shifting our gaze — if only slightly — to notice what is also true: that even in darkness, there are lights. Healing is more than gratitude, but it often begins there. Gratitude can reclaim attention from despair. To look for the helpers is to look for the living pulse of human kindness.

11/23/2025 "My Theology of Gratitude" Rev. Michael Leuchtenberger

A theology of gratitude offers a way to approach ultimate reality not through fear, submission, or entitlement, but through awe, humility, interconnection, and reverence. In a Unitarian Universalist frame, where belief is not bound to a single creed but to shared values and a free search for truth, gratitude can serve as a spiritual foundation and a lens through which we understand both divinity and our relationship to the universe.

11/30/2025 "The Practice of Gratitude Walks Us Over Many Bridges Toward Hope, Even Joy" Rev. Bevan Tulk

The Practice of Gratitude helps us notice what sustains us, even in times of Uncertainty. It invites us to walk with intention across life's many bridges: from sorrow to healing, from isolation to connection, from fear to courage. In today's worship, we'll explore how gratitude can be cultivated in daily life, how it opens the way toward hope, and how—sometimes quietly, sometimes radiantly—it leads us to joy. Whether you arrive with questions, weariness, or wonder, there is space here for your journey. Let us walk together, guided by gratitude, toward what is life-giving and true.


Speaking of community plate data, here are two reports of our contributions for the last 3 years, fiscal years 2023 through 2025.

The first chart shows the scope of the organizations we are supporting.


The second chart shows the total dollars, by cause, that our community plates supported. Community plate contributions totaled \$106,553 for the 3-year period.

Trash and Recycling Re-vamp: Another Step Towards Sustainability

We have standardized all our recycling and trash containers throughout the church building:

Black Bins: Trash

Blue Bins (with Recycling Logo): Recycling

All bins are labeled by location: e.g., Trash - Rainbow Room. If you notice a bin in the "wrong" location, please return it to the proper room. Each room now has a trash bin AND a recycling bin.

- Trash bins should always have a bag.
- Recycling bins should not have bags.

If you ever empty a trash can by removing the bag liner, please reline it with a new bag (there should be additional bags at the bottom of the trash can).

Please note that a **blue container for cardboard recycling** is now located in Fellowship Hall (next to the custodial closet). Please do not leave cardboard in the far corner of the kitchen (as has been the custom for a while). We are trying to keep the kitchen uncluttered.

Looking to Use your Conversational American Sign Language Skills?

If you do, then consider meeting with us on Sunday mornings at 8:30. There are a few of us who would like to practice using our skills. Reorganized Kitchen!

We have reorganized our kitchen to align storage locations with where items are most likely to be used. For example, "spatulas" are in a drawer below the new induction stove, "kitchen towels" are now in a bin close to the dishwasher, or everything "tea & coffee" related is now in one area.

Just about everything is **labeled**, so it would be wonderful if everyone could model putting items back where "they belong" and encourage others to do likewise, e.g., return "metal bowls" to where it says "metal bowls," or "peelers" into the drawer labeled for "peelers."

The goal is to keep our **countertops** as uncluttered as possible, so please help **put things away before you leave the building.** This includes any dishes you wash by hand and may temporarily leave in the drying rack. *Please don't leave any dishes for others to put away.*

If people leave behind **dishes that don't belong to the church**, they can be found on the counter closest to the entrance. A sign now reminds us that they will be discarded or repurposed after **three weeks**.

Lastly, there is a new **motion-sensitive light** that will turn on as you enter the kitchen - supplementing the regular kitchen lights (that still require use of the light switches near the doors). **It will automatically turn off 5 minutes after motion is last detected.**

Thanks in advance for helping to keep our kitchen clean and functional. We know it will take some extra time to get used to the new system, but we are hopeful that it will pay off in the long run.



Intercongregational Financial Review is Underway

Partnering for Financial Health

A key priority for the Board this year is to update and improve our Church's financial operations and organization. To that end we have partnered with the First Unitarian Universalist Society of Burlington, Vermont to co-create a peer-to-peer review of our respective financial structures. This cooperative approach allows us to gain objective insights and share best practices with a fellow UU congregation.

Our Teams Are Active and Engaged

Teams of 3 to 5 reviewers from both Churches have been assembled. Burlington's team members have strong finance and accounting backgrounds and have thus far shown much initiative and creativity. The Concord team is also well staffed including two CPAs! A huge thank you to Karen Mayo, Arthoen Wolf, and Tom Ketteridge for committing their time and expertise to this challenging project.

Progress Milestones

We have moved steadily and have already achieved several critical milestones:

- **Process Agreed:** We have established the review format, including a comprehensive list of documents needed to familiarize ourselves with both organizations.
- **Documents Submitted:** Lea and Burlington's lead administrator, Christina, have submitted most of the documents necessary for us to begin our internal review.
- Review Commenced: Both teams have now officially begun the desk review process.

Driving Towards an In-person Encounter

Once the document review is complete, the teams plan to meet for two days in November at our respective church sites. This time will be used for in-person verification and detailed discussions.

Following these visits, the teams will prepare a final report with findings and recommendations, which will be presented at a readout meeting with each Church's Board (and selected staff).

Our goal is to **complete the entire process in the first calendar quarter of 2026.** This timeline is designed to give our Board adequate time to assimilate the findings and prepare any necessary Bylaws change recommendations for the **May 2026 Annual Meeting.**
